5. Financial Sustainability

- ✓ AIM & Objective: develop sources of income to fund and sustain projects
- ✓ Dilemma: where to find funding?
- ✓ To date: developments efforts of treasurer raised circa \$25-50,000 per BENET/IBYC

The International Commission on Benedictine Education

Purpose of funds: primarily two-fold

- 90% scholarships for teachers/students
 - conference fee
 - transportation / flights
- 10% commission preparation meeting(s)

Goal: create / change financial culture and raise \$30,000.00 annually

The International Commission on Benedictine Education

Possible funding proposals:

- ✓ Subscription equivalent of \$1 per student annually for three-year cycle
- ✓ Nomination by school of amount based on World Bank category
- Annual fund-raiser by students with donation of any amount
- Annual gift from school of any amount
